Fundamental societal changes in personal aspirations, values and expectations of leadership.

By 2050 the World population is expected to increase by 32% and Asia is expected to represent 75% of World GDP.

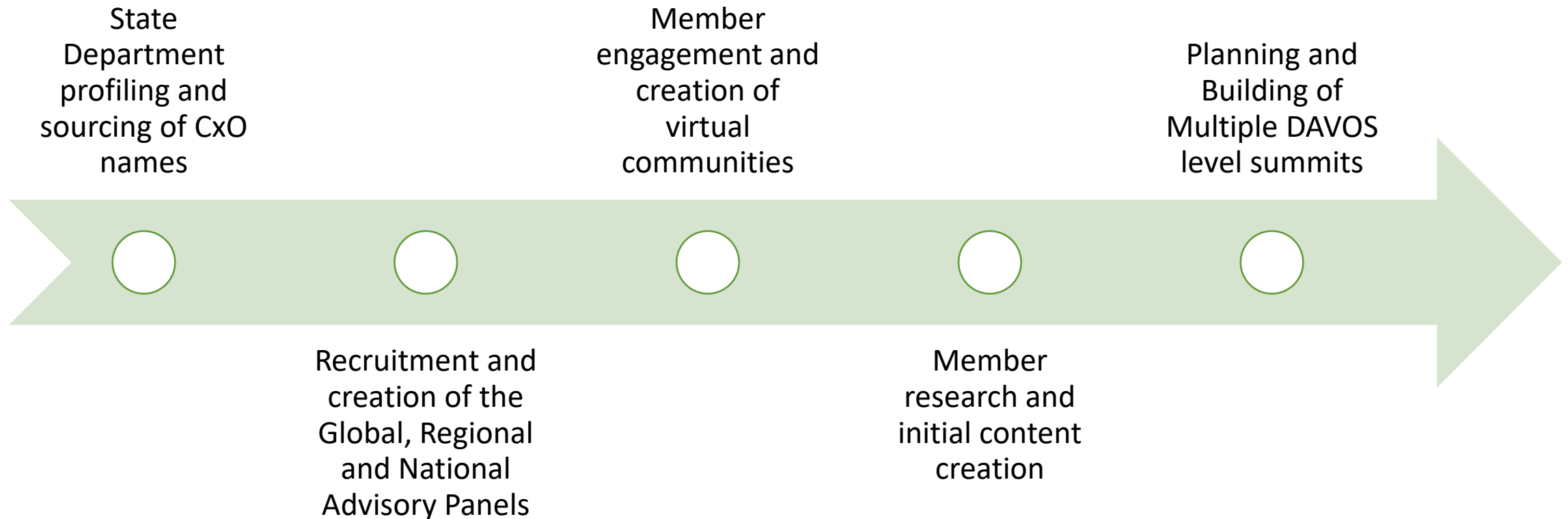
